Fresh, breezy, crisp, romantic—however you want to describe it, there is something undeniably alluring about the look of all white. It's not a style that you think of as being terribly practical for the cottage, though. Ice cream cones, muddy paws, sandy feet, wet bathing suits—who wants to spend time working extra hard to clean up after all that, just so your whites stay their brightest (or at least so they don't look too dingy)?

But perhaps white isn't as impractical as we might think. Whitewashed walls and furniture pieces painted in white latex enamel don't spell extra cleaning duties.

And these days, even white upholstery is becoming a viable option. For example, <u>Chella</u>'s fabrics are made to stand up to children and pets, sun and rain, and stains. The indoor/outdoor performance textiles are <u>solution dyed</u> so the colour stays true longer, and they're also mold, and mildew resistant. Plus, the fabric is machine washable.
